

Local Rules

These Local Rules are in addition to or may override those on the scorecard and are relevant to both the Lakes and Garden courses unless specified.

Rules 18-2, 18-3 and 20-1 have been modified as follows: When a player's ball lies on the putting green, there is no penalty if the ball or ball-marker is accidentally moved by the player, his partner, his opponent, or any of their caddies or equipment. The ball or ball-marker must be replaced as provided in Rules 18-2, 18-3 and 20-1.

Ground Under Repair – play prohibited.

- a. The garden surrounding the dead oak tree behind the Lakes 18th Green (The stone wall is an obstruction)
- b. Plantation areas - are those defined by orange-topped brown posts.
- c. Greenkeepers' workings, piled for removal – Grass cuttings, cores etc.
- d. **Any areas circled with white paint.**
- e. **Gravel-banded, pea shingle lines in the semi-rough which are effectively drainage lines as per the scorecard.**

Out of Bounds White posts demarcate most of these areas. Where there are no white posts the boundary fence or hedge defines the line.

Blue Stakes within Lateral Water Hazards Blue stakes within the lateral water hazards indicate drainage outlets. They are movable obstructions.

Lateral Water Hazards All our lakes and ditches are lateral water hazards whether marked or not. We are now using **marked lines** to define the margins in **some** of our lateral water hazards. The margins of the hazards without lines are defined by the line formed by the nearest outside points of the stakes at ground level. The margin of a hazard extends vertically upwards and downwards. A ball is in the hazard when it lies in or any part of it touches the hazard. **There is a Mandatory Drop Zone for the second lake on the 11th for any balls entering it from the tee.**

Temporary Local Rules

Bunkers A free drop, in the bunker, is allowed if the ball is in contact with any exposed matting.

Embedded ball through the green Through the green, a ball that is embedded in its own pitch mark in the ground may be lifted without penalty, cleaned and dropped as near as possible to where it lay but not nearer the hole.

Aeration Holes, Bird Damage and Sunken Bare Patches on Greens On the putting green, a ball that comes to rest on or in an aeration hole, a hole caused by birds, a repaired area or sunken bare patch may be placed at the nearest spot, not nearer the hole, that avoids the situation.
